This year's one-and-only fundraising campaign also helped our bottom line. It ran November through December and raised \$25,000. Lifesaving Skill

A Virginia girl scout saving her dad's life with CPR just 11 days after she learned how. Vada Carawan's Virginia Beach troop had practiced on a dummy, but last month, with her dad unresponsive on the floor, she was forced to put her training to the test. As she told WAVY News, it was scary. "I started tearing up.... 'What do I do?' ... For a minute there, I was in complete shock. And then I was like, 'Heart attack ... heart attack, 911." With the help of a dispatcher on the phone, Vada began chest compressions and didn't stop until paramedics arrived. Her dad is still in the hospital but on the mend. And Vada's message to all young people: "Just put your mind to anything that you would want to do," "(At) first, I was like, 'I don't know if I can do CPR,' but apparently, I can!"





Favorite Stories from 2024 Gus' Unlikely Journey

Remember the Emperor penguin that made the long, accidental journey from Antarctica to Australia a few weeks back? He's now back in the water and headed home. After washing ashore on an Aussie beach November 1st, he'd been cared for by wildlife expert Carol Biddulph, who named him "Gus" after the first Roman emperor Augustus. She plumped him up with plenty of food and TLC, before determining he was fit and ready to return to Antarctica. Over the Thanksgiving break, Gus was driven by boat several hours off the Australian coast, then released into the Southern Ocean. Ms. Biddulph said key to his recovery was a mirror. Emperor penguins are very social, she told the Smithsonian, and seeing his reflection was like having company. "When (you're caring for) two or three [penguins], it's great, they can bounce off each other, but when you've just got one, (like Gus), they just need that comfort of knowing they've got a buddy."



Junior Journalist

An 11-year-old reporter is giving professional sports journalists a run for their money. Jeremiah Fennell from Las Vegas all but stole the show at the Super Bowl's Opening Night festivities this week, conducting professional caliber interviews with the likes of Patrick Mahomes, Travis Kelce, and George Kittle. Jeremiah told the NFL Network he started his broadcasting "career" at age 7, because he wasn't able to play sports due to some medical issues adding "I started my YouTube channel and yes, I do think I can keep this as a career because I do still love the sport and I do know a lot about it, so I think interviewing people can be a long career for me." 
Tracking Santa






KidNuz Financials
